Customers at Newbury Farmers' Market in April will find a combination of traditional Easter fare with new products to tempt their taste buds.

The farmers' market, to be held on Sunday 5th and Sunday 19th April in the Market Place from 9am to 1pm, includes stalls selling traditional home-made Simnel cakes, hot cross buns, Easter cup-cakes and biscuits, as well as fresh seasonal vegetables, fish, goat's cheese, preserves and sauces, lamb, beef and poultry, and a new line of pork sausages.

Fiona Rackham, the market manager, is looking forward to the April markets: "Simnel cakes are now an Easter tradition, and they make very attractive gifts. The new sausages will be just right for barbeques, and there's always a good range of meat and fish for family meals during the holiday. Many of the stalls will have Easter egg hunts, and Fiona and Rachael from Give Me Cake will be dressed up as Easter Bunnies."

"We're welcoming back our goat's cheese producer, Michelle Stevens from Homefield House Dairy, who wasn't able to come to market recently because her goats were having their kids, and one of them had quads!"
